

Rob Scott Worship Committee

All of the aspects have been changed by the disruption of COVID but it has helped to provide new technology and new ways of worshiping. We began last Spring by holding outdoor services, Morgan and Vivian Daniel were instrumental; we moved into the church with help of Tammy Fites, Barbara Foote and Marie-Claire Dizin; We are now moving back into the beautiful sanctuary (Masked, family pods, distancing) We are hopeful to joyously worshiping all together.

Kathleen Alexander Missions

The Tues outreach has been active; Kristy Hollcraft and Matt Leach have opened up our Thursday outreach; Hoping to expand next year to have use of the Music Box; we have reached out to Haiti – and have made a donation. Alexi Wagner gave birth to Aurora and she and her husband are staying at Lord's Land until they are able to return; the congregation is grateful to Missions for their work and support.

Don Bettencourt Facilities

Have been working tirelessly on the facilities; a few problems – installing high efficiency filters in the church; our on demand hot water for the dishwasher may need to be replaced; The North side of the roof of Preston needs replacing; Fire alarm had to be realigned in the sanctuary; repair on South side of sanctuary is imminent. We have received a quote for solar panels for the church (35K) and are contemplating changing out the refrigeration in the kitchen. At the entry of Preston is an automated defibrillator. Have had issues in parking lot coming up with a plan to perhaps have a smart gate. We are moving forward in our plans for the slope . The locks have all been replaced on office and sanctuary. The congregation thanked Don Bettencourt.

Petra Schulte Deacons

She is grateful to the church community for helping out. The roles of the deacons are the focal point of knowing the needs of the church community. Thanks to so many who have been working hard being the deacons. Grateful to Kersti Stoen who wants to be a deacon. Grateful for the generosity of DGF funds with which we couldn't have done our work. Thank you to Deacons.

Lois Leister Finances

The past 2 years will always be known as pandemic years. We have been a presence here for 160 years. We pray to continue to be endemic. Our daily/weekly finances are run by the finance committee and the treasurer. We have continued to be blessed by the faithful giving by our members; in one way we were over the budget, but because of the Designated Gift Funds from various individuals we are able to meet our obligations, and we are looking at a potential of a shortfall of 40K for next year. We have been blessed with grants (Holli, Davis) this year. Lois said as we looked into the new budget, that she welcomed our comments. Debbie Anderson gave an example of using a Designated Gift Fund: ex – the music salaries were taken over the year from Frank Stanley fund. Basically, whatever comes into the church, we use it directly. A DGF is used for a particular designation. This year the music will come from the general fund rather than the Frank Stanley funds. Thanks to Bill and Cynthia Scott for their continued support and help.

Darlene Clay moved Rob Scott 2nd to receive reports. Passed

Personnel Committee Work of 2022

The Personnel Committee was led by Elder Sally Swan and supported by Pastor Matt Davis, Ann Fischer, Dale Leister, Karen Moreland, and William Scott.

Sally assisted MPC Office Manager, Tammy Fites to apply for LiveScan Security Clearance screening capability through the State Department of Justice. As of year-end 2022, we have not heard back from the State. The requirement to implement LiveScan Security Clearance for church staff and certain volunteers begins January 2024.

Office Manager Tammy Fites and Personnel Committee Chair Sally Swan coordinated a series of Mandated Reporter training sessions with a goal to complete training of all paid staff, elders and key volunteers by end of 2022. Most of this goal was accomplished, and there is a plan to complete training of remaining personnel in early 2023.

2021 Performance evaluations of staff were completed in 2022.

After a freeze on pay increases in 2021, non-ministerial staff received a pay increase of 7.28% effective January 2022.

The Committee brought forward recommendations for Pastor Terms of Call that were approved by the congregation in the February 2022 annual meeting.

We are grateful for the loving care, flexibility, and professionalism demonstrated by staff as we navigated challenges of the pandemic and alternative ways of working and gathering.

 Community Outreach with a lunch served every Tuesday at 1:30 thanks to volunteers (Betty Vrenios, Linda Banta & Jeannie Stickle, Debbie Turnbull, Judy Sinclair, Rosalie Scott, Kathleen Alexander, Lisa Snyder).

As of October 2022, we decided to move our Food Pantry distribution to Tuesdays to take advantage of the numbers coming for the Tuesday lunch. This increased the number of people utilizing the pantry. (Thanks to Pantry crew: Kristi Hollcraft, Ann Fischer, Matt Leach, Rosalie Scott, Paul Weakland)

International Missions:

- O **Seeds of Learning,** led by MPC's own Patrick Rickon, who oversees Learning Resource Centers for children and adults in Nicaragua, and a scholarship program for educational advancement and music and dance courses.
- Eglise Christ pour Tous in Jacmel, Haiti. pastored by Marc Cloveus building churches in mountain villages, disciples converts and hosts regional annual conference.
- O **Moriah Africa** in the Democratic Republic of Congo, a training center that also provides housing / garden plots for families whose homes were destroyed by tribal conflict.
- St. Francis Center for the Handicapped in Rwanda which provides physical therapy and training for children with cerebral palsy and other disabilities
- YWAM Alexey Wagner & Hunter Payne outreach to Azerbaijan
- Presbytery of the Redwoods and Presbyterian Church USA general mission commitment

2022 WORSHIP COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT

The Worship Committee was led by Elder Robert Scott and supported by Elder Sally Swan. Also serving were Rev. Matt Davis, Musical Director Marie-Claire Dizin, Office Manager Tammy Fites, Elder Lois Leister, Elder Kathleen Alexander, Elder Janis Porter, Karen Moreland, Natalie Knott, and Barbara Foote. Typically, the Worship Committee met monthly, on second Thursdays at 2:30. Meetings are hybrid – via zoom or in-person in the Fireside Room.

We started 2022 with face masks required for indoor service due to the pandemic. We did not sing, and we did not hold communion in Sunday service at the start of the year because of concerns of spread of Covid. Singing and communion service resumed in the spring. Communion servers wear masks as pandemic precaution.

We continue to offer online worship services even after returning to in-person services. Barbara Foote and Office Manager Tammy Fites create and post worship videos. We are incredibly thankful for having this online presence through their hard work.

The Church participated in interfaith Lenten services, and the April 6 service was held in the MPC sanctuary.

Easter Sunrise service continues to be a great outreach to the larger community as well as a joy for members and friends of the church. Many attended Easter Sunrise service at the Big River Beach with a beach fire, singing, prayer, communion.

We celebrated Mary Magdalene as an apostle and close companion of Christ with a special service with drumming, song, word, and reflection in July.

An animal blessing service was held in the outside courtyard in October.

A special "Blue Christmas" service was held the Friday before Christmas as a more solemn gathering to honor Christmas and Advent. Two worship services were offered Saturday on Christmas Eve, and a Sunday service was held on Christmas Day.

Worship was affirmed by study of the Bible through five Bible study groups – a men's group, women's group, two groups that meet at people's homes, and a Sunday morning study group led by Pastor Matt.

Reading of Creeds was added to Sunday communion services in November.

As noted by Brother Rob Scott, it is the prayerfulness of MPC that taps into the Holy Spirit affirming the larger community. We give thanks for the humble yet joyful spirit permeating our worship experience.

2022 Christian Education Annual Report

Overview

Mendocino Presbyterian Church offers a range of opportunities for Christian study, reflection and growth. Although we have more adult opportunities for study and spiritual formation, the Christian Education continues to create targeted opportunities for children, youth and college students. Pastor Matt hopes that in the next year we can articulate a balanced approach that directly impacts each of the generations from children to youth to young adults to adults to older adults.

Adult Learning Opportunities

We give thanks for ongoing studies like Woman's Bible Study, Men's Bible Study, Christian Spirituality Study and the Sunday Scripture Study. Respectively, we give thanks for the ongoing leadership for these groups: Pat Westfall, Don Bettencourt, Robert Scott, and Matt Davis. Please contact them if you would like more information and would like to join the groups.

Children's Learning Opportunities

On Sunday mornings, we give thanks for Celia Chaya who is faithful in being present and available during Sunday worship to take care of our infants and children. Celia welcomes new families to our community embodying love to everyone she meets. Thank you Celia!

Youth Learning Opportunities

We also give thanks for the adults who walked with your teenagers and college students. Coming back from COVID and starting from scratch with our middle school and high school students, we created an outdoor experience to generate traction and interest called: "Looking at Life with God from the Top-Down and the Bottom-Up." Thirteen students participated and five adults (April Cen, Rapael Cen, Jason Island, Erika Island and Matt Davis). The experience met students where they were at and encouraged them to experience the great outdoors going on hikes as well as participate in worship. Culminating in a pilgrimage to the Grand Canyon in Arizona....we had to delay the destination hike from April to October because of bad

weather. In the end, it was an incredible experience and we have energy moving into 2023. Critically, a \$20,000 gift from the sale of the Christian Camp was designated to the church for the purposes of "wilderness experiences" and "camp experiences" for our young people so that they might experience the grandeur of God. We give thanks to Debbie Anderson for championing the legacy of the Christian Camp and encouraging us with this gift in 2023.

Special Events

Last but not least, we give thanks for the occasional events in 2022 that happened through the Christian Education & Spiritual Formation Team. Three stand out: beach days, movie/game nights and October Pumpkin Party. These were great ways to engage and invite the community to be part of our family of faith. Over 60 people attended the pumpkin party and we hope that in the future such "stand-alone" programs might be a way for us to reach out to all the generations.

We also had the opportunity to purchase 49 backpacks for school aged children (kindergarten-high school) after we learned that Mendocino Coast Children's Fund had their storage sheds broken into which housed their school supplies.

It is with great excitement that the former Board of Directors of American Youth Service (Mendocino Christian Camp/Mendocino Redwood Retreat) and the Mendocino Community Foundation have disbursed a gift of twenty thousand dollars from the American Youth Service Fund of the Mendocino Community Foundation to Mendocino Presbyterian Church. This gift is to honor those former pastors and members who had, for many years since the camp's inception, worked diligently and tirelessly to develop the mission of Christian Camping, intended for youth who would not otherwise get such an experience in our exceptional North Coast environment.

In the early years following the 1979 incorporation of the camp, many people gave time, talent, and money to build a beautiful camp campus on the gifted 27 acres (which has been sold to provide the fund into the future). These early mission leaders partnered with youth groups who came to participate in spiritual exploration, and service, by building the lodge and cabins, and by doing service projects for others in the community outside the campus, while using the campus group social setting to grow in personal character. This gift is a testimony to the perseverance and love of those early leaders who carried the purpose to fruition, who modeled Christian character, service, and values.

It is our request that the money be accepted and designated for children and youth programs which carry on the growing of Christian character, service, and values. Like the AYS camp's objective, we hope these funds promote spiritual exploration, experience in the natural environment, and to address financial need to make these things possible. We ask that this money be used where there is a shortfall of funds otherwise earned through best efforts by and for the program participants.

Beyond this gift, because the land has been sold, there remains additional money within the American Youth Service Fund at the Mendocino Community Foundation, which will also be available in future years for use by all in the community, in accordance with established fund mission parameters of spiritual exploration in the natural environment. A grant application to the Mendocino Community Foundation process applies.





Pastor's Report

How might we live into the MPC Vision Statement for 2023? The MPC Vision statement reads as follows...

We are God's Love by:

Feeding those in need * Singing with the joyful * Comforting the sick and the suffering * Listening to those who want a voice * Walking in companionship with Jesus *

I have been thinking about this question a lot since Christmas. The new year always brings about the opportunity to do things differently. The turning of the calendar gives a sense of refreshment. Nothing like the promise of a new calendar with empty spaces to fill in with the good things in life.

There are four words that I want to embody as a type of mantra for the new year: Invite, Support, Energize and Advocate. These four words are a hope to me as I look at the calendar and all those empty spaces. These four words will be applied to the MPC Vision statement: invite, support, energize and advocate.

Invite: We have the opportunity to be intentional about inviting the community to be part of our church family. I give thanks for Elizabeth Vrenios sharing her gifts of conducting as well as other choir leaders like NormaLee Andres, Patricia Lacey and Barbara Foote who are stepping up.

Energize: As we bring our best ideas to the community, I know that the Spirit of Jesus will bless us. I give thanks for the new ideas of 2022 like Friday Night Live bringing fellowship, movies and opportunities to energize and encourage. The very location of Mendocino Presbyterian Church gives us the opportunity to encourage partnerships like the Mendocino Music Festival and the Mendocino Film Festival bringing vitality to our small community.

All three people embodied grace and faith and joy: Warren Wade, Danny Nelson and Helen Williams. Oh, what incredible people! Let us sing of their incredible faithfulness!
