

Pastor's Annual Report

Dear Mendocino Presbyterian Church Congregation,

Our Vision Statement reads:

We are God's Love by:

- Feeding those In need
- Singing with the joyful
- Comforting the sick and the suffering
- Listening to those who want a voice
- Walking in companionship with Jesus

2024 has realized this vision in unique ways. Whether it is our ministry of hospitality on Tuesday's or Thursday Choir practice or visits by our deacons or leadership development with our young leaders or weekly Sunday worship; MPC's leaders have cast a vision of God's love on the Mendocino Coast walking humbly with our Lord and Savior Jesus the Christ. I am thankful for every participant who contributes to this presence of vitality whereby the least, the lost and the lonely have arms placed around him. Of course, we are these very "weak" ones who humbly put our trust in God and God transforms our weakness into strength through solidarity. What a joy it is to serve along such elders, deacons, staff, volunteers and community leaders who give of themselves creating a safe place for sanctuary in Jesus' name.

As we enter into 2025, we will have the opportunity to live further into this identity whereby our unity is affirmed through solidarity. Locally, regionally and nationally there seem to be forces aligned to separate and divide. MPC's weakness–and thus our strength!– is that we know that we do not thrive because of our economic wealth or our brilliance of mind or our high style. We are humbled by our historic buildings built by our ancestors of faith which we can share with others. We are grateful to share a bench with a friend or stranger taking in a beautiful view talking about the simple blessings in our life. We are joyful to walk into Preston Hall and hear the power of elegant music from one of our partners like the Mendocino Music Festival or Redwood Symphony or the Community College Choir. From Rainbow Preschool to the "Ordinary Radicals" to our MPC Choir, we appreciate the little things in leadership that make a community. I give thanks for your God-given contributions that make our community vibrant.

Let us keep our vision clearly before us in 2025 even as we give thanks for 2024. One component of our gratitude is extended to our Music Director Elizabeth Vrenios whose commitment to excellence enhances our worship experience on a weekly basis. Elizabeth is directly contributing to our vision, helping us "to sing joyfully"!

Let me speak directly and honestly about her contributions and how to evaluate her contributions monetarily...challenging the community of faith to build up the necessary resources for excellence in music ministries in the future.

As Director Vrenios is serving pro bono, Session is overwhelmed in gratitude for her professional service at the same time that we want to be prepared in the future to fund such ministries. To direct a choir at a high-level requires a very specific skill set. There is no one currently on the coast who can do what Elizabeth does with our choir. Choir rehearsals are a spiritual experience and I invite you to join us to share in this unique ministry. As I attend practice each week with the MPC Choir on Thursdays, I can attest to Elizabeth's incredible teaching skills and visionary passion. Please note: in thankfulness to Elizabeth is not accepting compensation yet the Session wants to make it very clear how thankful we are for her service and to set monies aside preparing the congregation to prioritize this leadership in the future. I cannot help but think of Joseph's dream in Genesis. Also important for me to share: the American Guild of Organists used to publish a pay scale to help congregations faithfully honor choir directors, musicians and artists. Although they have stopped publishing this data for political reasons, the range for someone of Elizabeth's background and experience to lead choir rehearsals and worship is \$45,000.

To meet this high bar, Session has initiated a Task Force to make specific recommendations whereby the MPC Operating Budget can dovetail with our designated accounts creating the necessary funding sources. I ask you to pray and discern how you might support this essential music ministry by contributing above and beyond your annual pledge to such a fund. Be on the lookout for specific recommendations from this Task Force. If you have extra-commitment gifts that you would like to support MPC music ministries into the future, please contact either myself, Treasurer Lois Leister or Financial Secretary Michael Moreland.

MPC Deacon Annual Report 2024

Empowered by the Holy Spirit, the Mendocino Presbyterian Church Deacons demonstrate God's grace, love, and healing by bringing joy and belonging to those experiencing loneliness, rejection and hurt within the parishes and beyond.

Within MPC there are about 150 people (over 100 families) included in six parishes. Deacons seek to connect with all within one's parish through encouraging notes, prayers, emails, visits, and/or phone calls at least three times during the year. When individuals are known to be experiencing tough times additional contacts are sought.

Examples of Deacon Ministry include:

- ♥ Deacons on Call dedicated phone/message line: 707-397-1360
- ♥ As lay leaders, assist with Worship
- Participate in the monthly serving of Communion
- Provide assistance with member living space relocation
- Contribute financial assistance for healthcare, shelter, & transportation
- Assist with memorial and baptism receptions
- Connect people with other community resources.
- Support the Mendocino Coast Hospitality Center in Fort Bragg.
- Sought funding for rent subsidy support from Presbytery of the Redwoods Mission Committee, Leonard and Eleanor Clark Charitable Trust. Funds designated for The Founder's Fund at The Woods.

As Moderator, Susan represented the Deacon Board on Session and at the Commissioning of Sally Swan as Lay Pastor. Quarterly reports of Deacon Ministries were shared during Sunday morning worship by Susan and Linda. Worshipers are invited to support Deacon Ministries financially and otherwise. Offering envelopes are available in the pew racks for use throughout the year. Donations reported totaled \$6,126,000; the support gifted to others was \$3,641.87. Worship bulletins included a Deacon on Call phone number. As the number was called but once during the year, it was discontinued at the end of December.

Deacons meetings are hybrid, usually the First Friday of the month, 1:30 - 3:00 pm, in the Eidseth Parlor and Zoom. Others in the congregation and community at large are invited to come along side and be part of the Deacon ministry.

Annual Report on Missions at Mendocino Presbyterian Church

One of the most dynamic expressions of compassion and care at our church happens every Tuesday when 30 plus people come for a nutritious lunch prepared by a faithful cohort of volunteer cooks followed by access to a Food Bank pantry (see list below), capped by our guest Mark playing piano for a sing-along. Remarkably, it happens seamlessly with no single person in charge. We also offer access to showers and links to Hospitality Center's Street Medicine team and extreme weather housing vouchers. MPC also encourages offering our unemployed/unhoused odd job opportunities.

MPC's mission partnerships begin locally with support for Ft. Bragg School District's Bi-Lingual Family Liaison Giving Care Program led by Martha Madrid Lopez and for Hunter and Alexi Payne, leaders at Youth with a Mission at the Lord's Land in Mendocino. Our support also extends to Frontera de Cristo on the border with Mexico, to Pastor Marc Cloveus's mission in Jacmel Haiti, to Patrick Rickon, director of Seeds of Learning in Nicaragua, and to two partners in Africa --the Center for the Handicapped in Rwanda and Moriah Africa in the DRC.

For fun, MPC Mission also coordinates Friday Movie Nights for community with free pizza and a film.

2024 WORSHIP COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT

The Worship Committee was led by Elders Robert Scott and Sally Swan. Also serving are Pastor Matt Davis, Office Manager Tammy Fites, Elder Lois Leister, Elder Elizabeth Vrenios, Elder Janis Porter, Elder Karen Moreland, and acolyte Natalie Knott. Elder Kathleen Alexander, videographer Barbara Foote, Deacon Rosalie Scott, Debbie Turnbull, and Carie Anne MacAlpine receive agendas and minutes. The Worship Committee meets the second Thursday of each month at 2:00. Meetings are hybrid – via zoom and in-person in the Fireside Room.

We are fortunate for Pastor Matt Davis to lead worship services. Pastor Matt's messages of God's love reflect inclusiveness and emphasize our role in caring for all. Attendance and participation in Sunday service continues to grow, and 70-80 people join most Sundays. There are children most Sundays, and lately youth sometimes participate by ringing the bell, collecting offering, and reading scripture.

We hold Communion and come to the Lord's Table the first Sunday of each month. Deacons and Elders join Pastor Matt in sharing the bread and cup. Debbie Turnbull provides communion bread made with love. In March a third cup that holds juice was added to Communion service.

Elizabeth Vrenios leads the choir, and there is a new energy to the choir. Jack Leung is pianist, and Matt Leach is organist. Office Manager Tammy Fites creates weekly bulletins that reflect the liturgical season. Natalie Knox is lead acolyte. Elder Janis Porter coordinates ushers and greeters. Elder Karen Moreland coordinates liturgists. Barbara Foote creates, edits, and publishes worship video recordings. We are incredibly thankful for having this online presence that extends the reach of our mission beyond the physical church sanctuary. Debbie Anderson, Steve Gray, Jean Graham, and others ensure the sanctuary reflects and celebrates the seasons and holidays of the Christian year. Lois Leister oversees the banners and so much more. Steve Gray makes lovely and sturdy candles for Advent. Carie Anne prepares the lighting, sound system, and heater for Sunday service. Morgan Daniel oversees operation of the microphones and sound system. Michael Moreland accounts for Sunday service tithes and offerings. Many others contribute as well.

Elizabeth Vrenios began her tenure as choir director in March of 2023. We often have 15 or more choir members in Sunday service. The choir sings in front of the congregation for the Introit and Anthem and offers an Amen at the end of each service. We also exchange with the Fort Bragg Presbyterian Church choir two or three times a year which has increased the enthusiasm and musicality of the choir and allowed for a greater communication with the larger Presbyterian community on the coast. Jack Leung is pianist and is a blessed presence to the musical scene. In addition, Matt Leech offers the organ prelude each Sunday for which we are grateful. Our musical ministry has increased the visibility of music and worship in the congregation and has presented an opportunity for those who love to sing to participate.

The Church continues to participate in community interfaith Lenten and Advent services. MPC hosted the December 18 Advent service, and MPC Elder Alexi Wagner Payne delivered the message. The choirs of MPC and FPCFB also combined to join in Lent and Advent anthems.

Easter Sunrise service continues to be a great outreach to the larger community as well as a joy for members and friends of the church. Many attended Easter Sunrise service at the Big River Beach with a beach fire, singing, prayer, and communion.

We held beach service with singing, prayer, Bible reading, message, and communion on Big River Beach Sunday mornings at 9:00 in July and early August led by Pastor Matt and Elder Sally Swan.

Martha Madrid, Elder Paul Slaikeu (from Windsor Presbyterian), General Presbyter Reverend Eric Beene, Reverend Dr. Dorsey Blake (of the San Francisco-based Church for the Fellowship of All Peoples), and Elder Elizabeth Vrenios were guest speakers in September, allowing Pastor Matt time with family and in vacation.

An interfaith animal blessing service was offered in October, with Pastor Matt, Father Rob (St. Anthony's), and Elder Sally Swan leading the service that was on held on the church patio.

Two worship services were offered on Christmas Eve - a 6 PM and 9 PM service. A gathering of carolers sang Christmas carols on Main Street prior to the 6 PM service.

Elders Rob Scott and Sally Swan completed courses and were approved to proceed for commissioning as Lay Pastors by the Presbytery Committee on Preparation for Ministry. In December, the Presbytery of the Redwoods commissioned Elder Sally Swan as Lay Pastor.

Our weekly bulletins highlight our mission statement: We are God's Love by feeding those in need, singing with the joyful, comforting the sick and the suffering, listening to those who want a voice, and walking in companionship with Jesus.




One focus of our committee work this past year has been to discuss how we might make the financial reports more understandable and what educational tools might be instituted to assist both the Session and Congregation. We hope the resulting format will better represent a picture of the MPC Mission and how our financial stewardship is faithful to those ministries.

To help in that effort, Session recently approved a Task Force whose members are: Rod Lorimer (chair), Mike Williams, Morgan Daniel, consultants Lois Leister (Treasurer), Bill Scott (former Treasurer) and ex-officio Pastor Matt. In the coming months, the Finance Committee should receive their recommendations and after review will report to Session with possible action items.

We can all be thankful for the support from all who share their time, treasure and talents to the work of Christ's Church here in Mendocino and beyond.
